Dear Senators and Congressmen:

As a coalition of groups dedicated to the reauthorization and modernization of the Ryan White CARE Act, we wish to commend the Enzi-Kennedy-Barton-Dingell bill that will finally direct much-needed resources to communities battling the HIV/AIDS epidemic.

The primary goal of the Ryan White reauthorization has always been to ensure we are helping every American with HIV/AIDS who needs it and to ensure equal access to treatment and services for those affected by the disease, regardless of who they are or where they live. The Enzi-Kennedy-Barton-Dingell bill is a big step forward in ensuring that HIV/AIDS funding is equitable and available to keep pace with the epidemic for the next five years.

We applaud the tireless work of Congressional leaders in the Senate and House of Representatives. The Enzi-Kennedy-Barton-Dingell bill reflects months of hard work among Democrats and Republicans in Congress and years of hard work among community organizations across the country. The HIV/AIDS epidemic is expanding in America, and it is essential that the CARE Act keep pace with the epidemic. We believe that the Enzi-Kennedy-Barton-Dingell bill accurately prepares our communities to effectively battle HIV/AIDS disease now and in the future. The bill provides sensible guidelines for the use of Ryan White funds, placing a priority on life-sustaining medical care and treatment.

This Enzi-Kennedy-Barton-Dingell bill recognizes the HIV/AIDS crisis of today and directs federal aid where it is needed most. Moreover, for the first time, the CARE Act will include a provision dedicated to preventing the spread of the disease. We applaud Senators Enzi and Kennedy and Representatives Barton and Dingell for their tireless efforts on behalf of a compromise that addresses the needs of all Americans, and we call on the House and Senate to act promptly to finish the job and to approve the compromise bill

For individuals with HIV and AIDS, this bipartisan bill will be the difference between life and death. We wish to commend Congressional leaders who have provided a bill that will open the door for many disadvantaged HIV/AIDS patients across the country to effectively cope with the disease in the years to come.
